Most historians of twentieth-century American politics or religion or law or race or the South or even Florida land development include fundamentalism as a footnoted afterthought. None, however, pull all those stories together into one critical analysis. This is the story of evangelicalism in the twentieth century without the hagiographic “humble beginnings” mythology. It begins with a “booster” who conducted revivals in mid-size manufacturing towns where labor unrest motivated the business interests to hire a “law-and-order” revivalist who could guilt their employees into obedience. It carries on with a father who was so worried about his trouble-maker son that he started a high school out of a “tabernacle” to keep tabs on him. This booster/father used his local celebrity to sell land at revival-like meetings for a railroad tycoon who gave “banana republics” their sinister reputation. And that's just before 1927.

After winning the right to vote in 1920, U.S. women did not retreat and fade into the background as satiated national subjects only to reemerge forty years later to burn their bras, protest beauty pageants, and attempt to identify that pesky problem with no name. Instead, many continued the fight and shifted their attention to other means of securing political and legal equality with men. A year after passing the 19th Amendment, suffragist leaders Alice Paul and Crystal Eastman drafted a new constitutional amendment establishing that “men and women shall have equal rights throughout the United States and every place subject to its jurisdiction.” Senator Charles Curtis (R-Kansas) and Representative Daniel R. Anthony Jr. (R-Kansas), nephew of women’s rights leader Susan B. Anthony, first introduced ERA in Congress in 1923. Two years later, Congress held the first series of hearings to consider arguments favoring and opposing the amendment. A century later, both within and beyond the walls of Congress, the long and contested battle over ERA nevertheless persists.
As we approach the one-hundred-year anniversary of ERA’s first introduction to Congress, the time is ripe for revisiting how women across generations have argued about how this amendment—if enshrined in the U.S. Constitution—might reshape and reimagine our democracy. In contrast to narratives that begin with the 19th Amendment and then propel us forward to the 1970s, this book seeks to inclusively account for how women have shaped the ERA debate since its inception through the present day. Ours is an anthology of primary texts, many long forgotten and others previously unavailable, that reveals the nuanced, complicated, and sometimes contradictory ways that women have approached the question of whether we need the Equal Rights Amendment.

In the spirit of Kenneth Burke's comic critique, this book crafts a vocabulary for understanding separatist rhetoric by extending Kenneth's Burke's notions of tragedy and comedy. I argue that religious sectarian discourse falls outside the tragic or comic frames of acceptance but operates within a third frame—romance. Although neither tragically goaded by nor comically laughing at the dream, the religious separatist seeks to embody “whatsoever things are lovely” in order to woo their lonely Other.

As America braces itself for the 2024 presidential election, National Public Radio’s headline pulled us back a century: “Ghost of William Jennings Bryan haunts Trump’s next run for the White House.” The similarities are striking. Both Bryan and Trump articulate a pseudo-populism, advocating for the common man while being anything but working-class. Both enjoy a quixotic cult of personality (especially among white nationalists). Both articulate a not-quite-orthodox religion that feels familiar to conservative Protestants. And both use a commanding rhetorical delivery that captivates listeners.

Scholars have connected Trump and Bryan since 2015. With William Jennings Bryan as a popular touchpoint to understand our current public sphere and with 2025 marking the centennial anniversary of the (in)famous Scopes Trial, rhetorical scholars must reckon with William Jennings Bryan’s rhetorical legacy and the way it haunts our current public sphere.
